Tues., Dec. 4. Wkd on "Shi-king" till breakfast, and afterward till train time. No train through to Peking today on acct of movement of troop-trains, but got one as far as Kalgan. Snow on all higher crests. Great Wall visible for miles along foot of hills N. of river. Wkd on "Shi-king" all day. Arr. at Kalgan at 5.15 p. m. & to hotel. After early supper wkd on "Shi-king" till abt 9 and to bed. Very cold clear.

Wed., Dec. 5. Up early & after breakfast took rickshaws to B. A. T. & Standard Oil Co. to see if I could sell my six-shooter. Robbers very numerous & bold here; nearly all runaway soldiers, going about in gangs of several thousands & committing all sorts of depredations & atrocities, for which the Manjols get the blame. Soldiers coming from Peking all last night. Fears that t'u-wei or robbers may loot Kalgan at any time. Got train to Peking at 11.30 a. m. Wkd on "Shi-king" all day. Arr. at Peking at 6, & home at 7.30.

Found letters from Sayce, Waller, Mellows,
Hew. Clear & cold.

Thurs., Dec. 6. To Hartung's about my
Yün-kang pictures & making slides, then
about Peking getting more local views, &
home for tiffin. In p.m. wrote & studied
till 4, then to Hartung's, & hotel, where I saw
Larsen, & home for dinner. Spent eve.
studying British Museum's "Guide to the
Bronze Age". Cold & windy; dust storm a.m.

Friday, Dec. 7. Wkd at corresp. till
10.30, then to barber's, Hartung's, Legation;
then home & studied till tiffin. On acct's
& photographs. After dinner wkd & studied
till 11.30 & to bed. Cold & windy.

Saturday, Dec. 8. Copied letter to Dr.
Harrison & mailed it, then to Hartung's about
slides. Spent p.m. in study. Bentz in for
dinner & afterw'd he & NEB and I w the

hotel for the evening. Spent most of the eve. talking with Rodney Gilbert about Chinese antiquities. Cold & windy.

Sun., Dec. 9. Spent a.m. studying "Guide to the Bronze Age". After lunch took a long ride with Boles and abt 5 p.m. N.E.B. + I went with the Hobarts to Union Church service, & later to Hobarts' for dinner. Home abt 10 p.m., wked an hour, & to bed. Cold day.

Mon., Dec. 10. Took 8.40 train to Lientsin with Jung to see about his passport to U. S. Saw Price at the Consulate + Mr. Li at the Foreign Commissioner's; delay because new regulation calls for 4 copies of applicant's photograph; we went to photographer's at once, & then to Flood Refugee's camp at Agricult. Exp. Station & saw my old friend F. M. Pyke, who has charge of 3000 refugees; he took us through the camp & explained what

was being done. Took some photos, in very poor light. Back to Peking on 5 p.m. train. Read after dinner. Cold + windy day.

Tues., Dec. 11. To Tientsin again; on train wkd on "Guide to Bronze Age". Lunch with S. M. Pyke, at Mrs. Robinson's. Then to photographers + got Lung's photos, then to Foreign Commis and got Lung's passport, by wh. time too late to finish up at the U. S. Consulate, so home on 5 o'clock train. Rodney Gilbert in for dinner + we talked till midnight on Ch. antiquities. Cold windy.

Wed., Dec. 12. To Hartung's + saw slides, then to Legation + home. Found Bobbs had cut his forehead rather badly, that Mr. Upham had taken him to the German Hospital where Dr. Dipper sewed the cut up; took 3 stitches. Wkd on my report in p.m. + EVE. Cold day.

Thurs., Dec. 13. To Tintsin Press, Hartung's Legation; saw Dr. Tenney abt maps. In p.m. to Chas. D. Jameson, the well known engineer, in charge of Hwai River Conservancy, as Dr. Tenney told me he had offered to lend me his set of tracings of Owen's Atlas, now long out of print. Had a most interesting talk with him he not only gave me the tracings but also a copy of a monograph of his on flood control in Ch., containing some very interesting information regarding the early history of the Yellow River. Then home + to F. S. Lapham's, Miss Holland's, hotel, home again abt 8.30 p.m. Read "Guide to the Bronze Age" in the evening. Cold + windy day.

Fri., Dec. 14. Snowing when I got up. To Legation, Cook's, hotel, Hartung's, Tintsin Press, Hirsbrunners, Pharmacy, Home. Packed in p.m., then to Hotel, Club, back to hotel + saw NEB, Benty, Hansen. Read in

evening. Cold day.

Saturday, Dec. 15. After breakfast to Pharmacy, Bank, Cook's, Legation; Cook's again, then took N&B out to hotel for luncheon with Mr. Larsen. Home early in p.m. finished packing & wrote letters of recommendation for my servants; also wrote Price, Cook's at Shanghai relative to Lung. Then to Upham's, hotel, & back to Upham's, where I found my family ready for dinner. Then to station. Bentz & Larsen down to see us off. Lung & Kung down with the luggage. Left Peking abt 8.40 p.m. Very cold.

Sun., Dec. 16. On route. Spent day on "Guide to the Bronze Age" in cataloguing & arranging films. Arr. at Mukden in eve. Many types in station, Mongol, Manchur, Chinese, Korean, Japanese, etc. Got train for Fusan after short wait. Very cold.

Mon., Dec. 17. Crossed Yalu in early a.m., had luggage inspection, but my stuff all passed unopened on acct of my letter from Ambassador Sato. Passed Seoul abt dusk. Very cold a.m., moderating as we go south.

Tues., Dec. 18. Arr. at Fusan in early a.m. & went aboard S.S. "Dei Marie". Fine sunrise. Rough crossing to Shimonsaki, where we arr. after dark, & where two Englishmen back from shooting trip in Korea helped us get on. Took 7.10 Express for Tokyo. All berths sold, so had to sit up in observation car. Much warmer.

Wed., Dec. 19. Fine views along the way, esp. of Fuji. Arr. at Tokyo abt 8.45 & took taxi to Aoyama, to my father's house. Father & stepmother made us all very welcome. Fine day.

Thurs., Dec. 20. Spent a m. working on my films + in p.m. to station abt luggage, then to Ginza, Pharmacy, King's Shotcai, home abt 4.30 + read till supper. Luggage came in eve., + N&B and I spent eve. at our unpacking. Fine day.

Fri., Dec. 21. Spent day unpacking, + in coloring prints. Studied in eve. Fine.

Sat., Dec. 22. To Central Station abt luggage, then to Yokohama, to International Bank, Bible Society, Watanabe's, Menzo's, Hotel de France, back to Watanabe's + selected some Japanese slides, + so back to Aoyama. At the Hotel de France met Mr. + Mrs. Clark King, who came to Japan on S.S. "China" when I crossed in her last spring. Studied in eve., + to bed early. Clear + chilly.

Sun., Dec. 23. Colored prints in

a.m. After lunch took Babs to the Naval Museum, then across the Sumida to the Island, then back to Yenkiji & saw the house where I was born being torn down. Back to Aoyama for supper, & studied in eve. Fine day.

Mon., Dec. 24. Spent day at home, studying, writing, etc. Wrote Purvis, C. L. Harrison, Dr. G. B. Gordon. Cloudy.

Tues., Dec. 25. Snowed a little last night, but this morning clear. Had Christmas Tree for our children, & had very good roast goose for dinner; some Japanese guests & the ladies of the Jo-Sakuin present. Bishop Harris & Mr. Alexander also called. Spent most of the day studying & writing. Clear & cold.

Wed., Dec. 26. To Yokohama in a.m. Went to Shos. Cook's, Hotel de France,

Watanabe's, Hotel de France again, & back to Tokyō. Read Aston's translation of "Nihongi" in eve. Clear & cold.

Thurs., Dec. 27. To Embassy in a.m. & saw our new ambassador, Mr. Morris, abt getting my things through the Customs without opening them. In p.m. wrote letters & read "Nihongi" till dinner. In eve. with NEB & Webster father & stepmother to Jo-gakuin heard Mr. Blank's recite. Studied later. Clear & cold.

Fri., Dec. 28. Studied all day, & evening. Clear & cold.

Sat., Dec. 29. To Yokohama in a.m. Dr. & Mrs. Wainwright on train with me; had interesting ^{talk} with former on Ch. anti-
quities. To "Empress of Russia" and saw the Kings & Mr. Jaehne & Frederic Coleman. Then to Cook's, Watanabe's, Hotel de France

for lunch, Britt's, North + Rai's, back to Tokyo. Worked rest of day + eve. Fine.

Sun., Dec. 30. Worked in a.m. To Blankes' for lunch; NRB + Webster also there, as well as a Mr. Cook of India. Wkd all p.m. + eve. Fine but cold.

Mon., Dec. 31. To U. S. Embassy + saw the new counselor, Mac Murray, about my things, then to Tsukiji + saw the Johnsons, + home for lunch. Wkd in p.m. and in eve. with NRB + Webster + Miss Harms to the Ginza to see the New Year's Eve decorations + booths, etc. Walked up and down betw. Shinbashi + Kyobashi + home by 11.30 p.m. Fine day.

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Wkd in a.m. + after lunch with father + stepmother + NRB + the boys to see the new houses on the compound. Wkd the rest of the

p.m. Bishop Harris, the Martins, + Capt. Wm H. Hardy, survivor of Commodore Perry's expedition, in for dinner. Had interesting talk with Capt. Hardy about old days in navy + merchant service; told some interesting tales of Chinese pirates. After the guests left came upstairs + back to work again. Warm + hazy.

Wed., Jan. 2. Rained in a.m. but cleared up later. Spent a.m. packing + getting ready for Kyoto trip. P. m. + eve. on my notes. Fine p.m. + eve.

Thurs., Jan. 3. Took 8.40 train to Kyoto. Spent day annotating Bertin's "Grandes Guerres Civiles du Japon." Arr. at Kyoto in eve. + to Kyoto Hotel. Spent eve. reading. Fine.

Fri., Jan. 4. To Yokoyama's after breakfast + arranged about listing, describing, packing, + shipping the articles I bought of

him last summer. Then to bank, & paid him balance on his acct, had lunch at Maruyama Park. Visited shops in p.m. & wrote letters. Read Lyell's "Antiquity of Man" in eve. Fine day.

Sat., Jan. 5. Took morning train for Tokyo; Yokoyama drove to see me off. Spent day reading Lyell. Got home about 9 p.m. Found note from Langdon Warner awaiting me. Fine day, lovely sunset view of Fuji from train.

Sun., Jan. 6. Read awhile after breakfast & took trip with N&B to Senkakuzi to show her the graves of the forty-seven Ronins. In p.m. with father & stepmother to Giza Church, and saw Mr. Clement & their old friends; then walked to Senkuzi with father & saw the house where I was born, now nearly torn down; then called on Dr. Wainwright home. After supper with

NEB & Webster to a gramophone shop and heard some Japanese records & bought a few to take home. Read remainder of eve. Fine day.

Mon., Jan. 7. To Yokohama with NEB abt slides, tickets, passports, luggage, etc. After return from Yokohama NEB went back to Aoyama while I went to Kyobunkwan & Maruzen. At latter place met Langdon Warner and he took me to his rooms at the Station Hotel for a talk over future work in Oriental archaeology. Fine day.

Tues., Jan. 8. Spent the day at packing. Father & stepmother gave a farewell dinner for NEB & me, but NEB too ill to come down. Mr. & Mrs. John Strublers, Prof. & Mrs. Clement, and Dr. & Mrs. Altomans, Bishop Harris, & Langdon Warner present. Fine day.

Wed., Jan. 9. Packed till 5 p.m., then out for a walk with N.E.B. Packed in eve. till nearly midnight. Fine.

Thurs., Jan. 10. Finished packing trunks, & took them to Yokohama to make sure they got down in time; also got tickets, slides, passports, etc. Great stringency about passports; S.S. Co. would not accept visé from U.S. Embassy at Tokyo or U.S. Legation at Peking, both of which I have, so had to get another from U.S. Consulate General in Yokohama. Also found that all luggage has to be examined on dock before being rec'd on steamer, wh. only stops long enough to receive passengers, as she is a coolie transport. Got back to Tokyo late in eve. & found cablegram fr. Dr. Harrison reading "Don't bring Lung; no authority." This upsets things a bit in case Lung made connections with the steamer at

Shanghai, wh., however, is doubtful, as there have been serious disorders along the Yangtze, and he had little time as it was. Fine day.

Fri., Jan. 11. To station after breakfast + went to Yokohama, father accompanied me. Found steamer not in yet, and not allowed to use wireless to communicate with her, as she is a transport, so unable to learn if Lung on board, or to apprise him of Dr. Harrison's cablegram. Also told it was out of the question to refund passage money as the accommodations were all sold and it would be impossible to get a substitute at such short notice, as passport formalities require a couple of days. So decided to take Lung along at my own expense, so that if any question about authority to take him into U.S. arises, Museum will not incur any responsibility. Steamer finally docked about 3.30. Lung went

ashore to look for me, so I did not find him till about 5. Lieut. Cooper of Peking aboard in charge of coolies; about 1000 on board. Before embarking, wrote a note to Hamada asking him to help Warner in any way he could. Fine day.

Sat., Jan. 12. At sea. Spent day on my notes, talked in eve. with Lieut. Cooper about the transport of coolies to France; he says perhaps 100,000 have gone already. The lot on board are a fine lot, and when they return to China will no doubt do much to introduce modern ideas.

Sun., Jan. 14. At sea. Wrote all day on my field notes.

Mon., Jan. 15. At sea. Continued working till 5 a. m., then slept till 10 a. m., and back to work again.

Tues., Jan. 15. At sea. Continued at
work till about 3 a.m., slept till 9 a.m.,
& to work again.

Wed., Jan. 16. At sea. Continued at
work on my notes till abt 4 a.m., slept
till 11, and to work again.
