

Dear Dr. Rainey:

We will be glad to publish your article "Archeology and its new technology." One of the reviewers has commented, however, that there is evidence of hasty writing and that you have written better in the past. We agree, and although we are willing to publish the article as it stands, subject only to the usual editing, we think a more polished draft might receive more favorable attention from readers. The reviewer also remarks that a lot of the vital steps in each process are not mentioned.

I have also had one of the copy editors go over the manuscript, and she has suggested some changes in wording. Most of these are minor, and the reasons for them seem self-evident, but we recognize that you may prefer to accomplish the same purposes with your own words. We are especially anxious to avoid changes of meaning. If you find them in any place, please examine the original phraseology closely and try to provide new wording, different from the original, for our experience has been that, if the copy editors misinterpret a sentence, readers outside the author's field often make a similar misinterpretation.

It seems to us in any case that the section on the organization of studies at Oxford and MASCA (bracketed on pp. 4-5) is of limited interest to those not directly involved and should be considerably condensed, perhaps to two or three sentences. Also, the calculation of standard deviation in Table 1 does not seem necessary for our readers.

Finally, the reproduction of the figures presents a number of problems. These are listed on a separate sheet.
