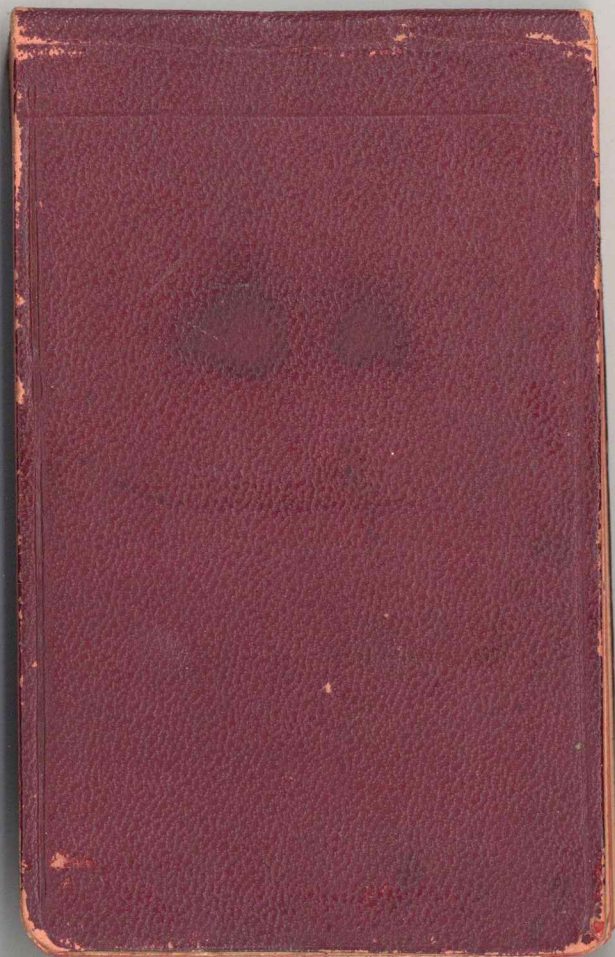

I am a Mahealani by caste, we are very high caste Mahealanis and our people pay us great respect. All my friends are government officials and I have for my friends the Extra Assistant Deputy Commissioner, The Sub Inspector of the police, and The Mayor. They come to my house and talk with me daily. My father and my grand father were rich men and we owned many tea gardens but that has all passed away for my father did not understand the business and the English men came and

and spoiled the tea houses
for the Assamese.

But we still have a little
money for my father writes
the appeals. He, petitions

for the Assamese gentle-
men when they go to court
and sometimes he makes
fifteen sometimes five
rupes a day. My brother
is at Dibrugarh on the railway
and he makes 60 Rs per
month. and my younger
brother is assistant to

and he makes thirty rupes
and we live very well.
Yes we all live together
and when we have no

employment then my
father feeds us and my
brother he gives us money
and when I work I
also share it with my
brothers. I have a wife
there 12 years old - we are
newly married before the
Johis came to Lokoja
we even be trothed many
years before - and I did
not see my wife until we
were to be married -

No! I did not wish to be mar-
ried but they compelled me
for our Thostra says that
unless a brother marries
and has a son it will all
be up with him in the next
world - I ran away twice

and my father was very
angry with me. But in the
end I came back and now
I have my faithful son
son. And is she happy
does she love you?

Oh yes ver? Why not?
For she has a day that un-
less a girl is married at
puberty, she is an outcast
and it would be a great
shame to her family unless
she had a husband and of
course she is very much
pleased to have me for a
husband. One time she
gave my mother the wrong
medicine and made a
great blunder and I beat
her and she cried and for
many days I punished

her but she did not repent
it for I am her husband
and she did a grievous wrong.
And then if I should die
she would become a widow
and have her head shaved and
eat but once a day and wear
only the white garments and
be a slave in my father's
house. So she is very good
to me and careful in my ill-
ness lest I die & she be
come a widow -

back and they both began
to howl & cry -
It's aunt has to pack up
and said for me to I

no chance at all and
submitted to its fate.
