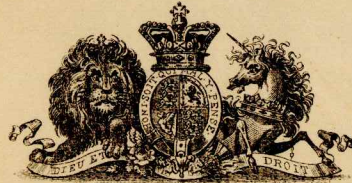

Bataks in another month.
