made of "Mingris" wood.
From the Belaga River

Kayan or Kenniah
Woman's Paddle.

The Kayans and Kenniahs are closely allied tribes, differing only in a few customs and traditions

Sticks used to obtain
fire

— . —
The flat stick is held down on the ground with the knees, and the round stick is pressed into the little hole cut to receive it, and then rapidly rotated between the palms of the hands. Those who are skillful get fire in about forty five seconds.

Kayan or Kenniah
Paddle.

Spear used by the
Kayan and Kenyah
tribes in war or on
the hunt.

Kinds for shaping the pith
shaftments of the poisoned
arrows.

Poison used on the arrows.

It is a watery extract from
the bark of the "Ipoh" or Upas
tree. When introduced in the
circulation it kills in about three
minutes.

A bird-call used by
the Punans to attract
the wild pigeons to a
snare.

Shells used in
playing the game of
"Chang-Koro"

The object of the game is to turn
the shells over on their concave side
by a tap on their edge.

Whip-tops

The one on the right is
made of coarse, white
coral

Hair-pins worn
by the men.

the northern group of
Luchu Islands

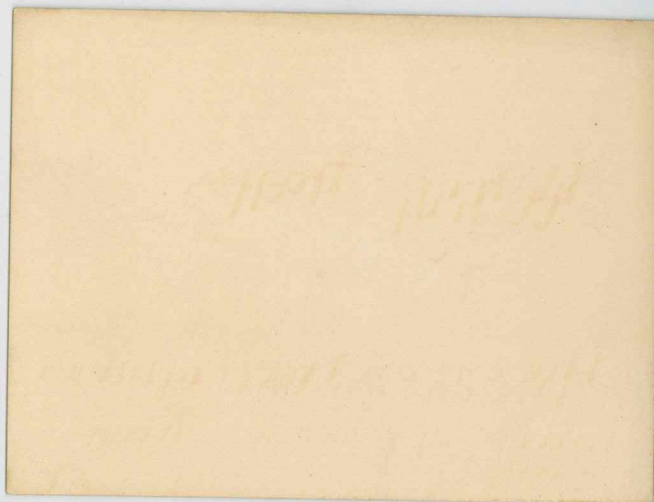
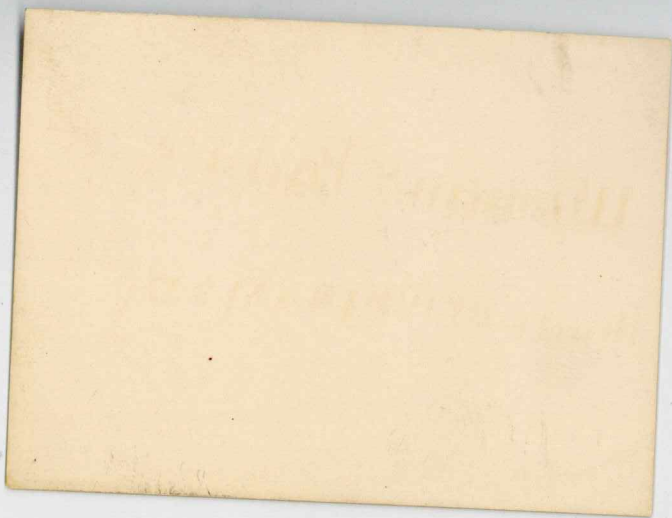
Hat made of inter-
